In the world full of risks and divisions who can take the leadership and responsibility to prevent global governance fragmentation and ensure a balanced and strong economic recovery? The BRICS in the Beijing Declaration reiterated support for the G20's leading role in global economic governance. Will the G20 indeed be able to overcome divisions to respond to global challenges? What are the alternatives? Can the BRICS or "BRICS plus" advance inclusive global governance (equitable and representative multipolar international order)? What are the priorities for cooperation?

15.15-16.30 MSK Session 2. Challenges and opportunities for shaping inclusive global digital governance.

Digitalization can transform economies, promote economic growth and sustainable development. But the market forces will not generate digitalization-based social benefits. Creating global public goods requires cooperation and collective governance. The UN Secretary-General called to prioritize building of digital governance and proposed a Global Digital Compact as part of the Summit of the Future in 2023. However, little progress has been made since the Secretary-General's Roadmap for digital cooperation release. The BRICS expands its dialogue on a wide range of digital economy. But it needs to move from engagement to cooperation. The G7 seeks to establish the global digital order based on its standards and norms, as stated in the Policy Priorities for Germany's G7 Presidency in 2022. Risks that this new order would exacerbate the inequalities of the old Bretton-woods system are high. Digital transformation and governance gained prominence in the G20 agenda especially since we went on-line after the pandemic broke out. But the divisions between the G20 members are likely to result in an impasse. Proposals on the future of global digital governance range from an UN-led Distributed Co-Governance Architecture (a multilayered, multilateral, multi-stakeholder and multidisciplinary framework with the UN central role) to a Digital Stability Board (or Data Stability Board) established by the G20. What can be done to ensure that emerging global digital economy governance is truly fair, reflects the interests of all countries and promotes inclusive and sustainable development?

14.00-15.15 MSK Session 3. Priorities for advancing global sustainable development.

The multiple risks disrupted progress towards the SDGs. To recover stronger together and get 2030 Agenda implementation back on track in all its three dimensions – economic, social and environmental – we need inclusive growth and equitable economic and climate governance, sustainable and secure energy, resilient and responsive health systems. This is not feasible without multi-stakeholders' cooperation and effective and pragmatic regional and global partnerships. The G20 and BRICS support the UN in coordinating global effort for the 2030 Agenda, but the inequalities are huge and growing. How to harness new drivers for development and create development-enabling environment? Is it possible to forge truly effective development partnerships? Do we need new institutions to support implementation of the Paris Agreement, like the climate club initiated by the G7? Or should we strengthen cooperation within the UN processes? What can the G20 and the BRICS do to make green transition truly inclusive?
